

These are all means that allow us to get into the homes of our community. However, no one thing should be considered "This is it!" The MOST effective means of getting into the community? Each person, inviting his friends/acquaintances!

This is not written to commend or condemn the sentencing in the trial. I am sure that there are many opinions about her sentence, even among the Jean family. Brandt acknowledged that he was only speaking for himself when he said to Amber Guyger, "I don't even want you to go to jail." I am writing this to consider the incredible gesture of forgiveness of Brandt Jean. He and his family are Christians. This was Brandt trying to live the life of Jesus in his own life.

Forgiveness? Jesus commanded it. Even the 70 x 7 forgiveness. Forgiveness? Even when Jesus was being crucified he prayed, "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do." (How many of us would have prayed, "God, get 'em.") At the heart of the word forgive in Greek (aphiemi) is the idea of "to let go." Now the word is translated in a variety of ways, depending on its context and usage. The NASB translates it with over 25 words and phrases, once again, depending on the context and usage. Most often it is translated "forgive/forgiven, etc." We know that when God forgives, our relationship is restored with him. For the relationship to be restored the offender must repent.

Repentance? There is the necessary obligation to forgive when the offender repents (Luke 17:3). Forgiveness may not be easy, even if the offender repented. But I *must* forgive as a Christian. No doubt this influenced Brandt's attitude. He had heard her say, "I'm so sorry. I never wanted to take an innocent person's life. I wish he was the one with the gun that killed me." I do believe Brandt's words that day reflected his doing his best to reflect the love of Christ in his own life.

Consequences? In this life, repentance and forgiveness does not always mean the reprieve of the earthly consequences. Sorry or not, Amber Guyger had killed an innocent man. As a result of this crime, she was tried, convicted, and sentenced. In this life, the saying goes, "if you do the crime, you do the time."

Grace? The fact of her guilt . . . the fact of her being convicted and sentenced to 10 years in jail does not mean that she is beyond the reaches of God's grace. This, to me, is what is so amazing about God's grace. No matter the crime, sin, or transgression, if I accept God's grace (remember, we accept it on God's basis), and subsequently live a faithful life, I can be forgiven, and one day have a home in heaven. Brandt had this hope for the woman who killed his brother.

Do we have this much forgiveness in our own hearts?



GRACE AND OBEDIENCE, AGAIN

There is much fuzzy thinking about grace. Emphasizing grace biblically does NOT deny the necessity of obedience. Emphasizing the necessity of obedience biblically does NOT deny grace.

Salvation is a gift of God (Ephesians 2:8). We do not earn it. We do not earn most of it, or part of it, or even a little bit of it! As sinners we deserve death. When a sinner is justified, it is totally unearned and, in that sense, totally of grace.

Some are disturbed anytime "entirely, only or totally" occurs near grace, but grace is the only basis on which a sinner can be saved. Grace implies gift, distinct from what is merited. A gift is not earned; anything earned is not a gift (Romans 4:4-5).

Obedience, however, is necessary. We must walk in the light (1 John 1:7), not after the flesh but after the spirit (Romans 8:4). We are saved by grace through faith (Ephesians 2:5) and saving faith is not dead but living and obedient (James 2:14-26).

Obedience is necessary for salvation to occur. We obey from the heart and are then made free from sin (Romans 6:18-19). We MUST be baptized to wash away our sins (Acts 22:16). (The Calvinistic idea of "salvation by grace only" is an entirely [!] different thing).

Obedience is necessary to remain in grace. We are kept by the power of God through faith (1 Peter 1:5), a faith which is also active and obedient.

We must not think that being baptized we earn our salvation, or that by living the Christian life we put God under obligation to us. We must not believe we have to achieve our own salvation. We should not shift the focus of our trust from Jesus to our own obedience. In our teaching we need to be careful not to lead others to do these things, which are a denial of the gospel.

On the other hand, we must not think obedience does not matter, that one may be saved without being baptized, or that the baptized believer may rob, cheat, commit fornication, forsake the church, without repentance, and still stand in the grace of God. And we need to be careful not to lead others to believe that! That, too, is a denial of the gospel.
