As We Begin to Assemble Again...

This Sunday, June 28, Eastern Meadows will once again assemble in her building at 8464 Vaughn Road! We can all be excited to assemble again! Worship will be in spirit and in truth, but some things will be different.

Important - Do not come if you are sick (not even a cold), especially if you have fever!

Assemblies: The only assembly will be the 10 a.m. worship. There will be no Bible classes and no Sunday evening worship at the Eastern Meadows building. Sunday class will be streamed online Sunday at 5 p.m. The Wednesday class will continue to be online on Wednesday at 6:30 p.m. Sunday morning worship will continue to be streamed. All current children and teen classes will continue on video only. There will be no attended nursery at the building.

Doors to Enter - The only doors to enter from the front are the east

west auditorium doors and, from the back parking lot, the back door of the midway foyer. There will be someone with a mask on to open the door for you (we are doing this to minimize touching). When you exit, the doors will again be held open for you. Please do not use any of the Fellowship Hall doors.

Masks - Due to the executive order effective June 19th for the city of Montgomery that requires the wearing of masks in public places, we will provide masks for those who need one. The masks we can provide are 100% cotton and can be washed up to 15 times. Masks will be worn at all times except when necessary to remove it such as during the Lord's Supper. (If you figure out a way to take the Lord's Supper while wearing a mask let us all know!)

Respect People's Space - You are kindly asked not to shake hands or hug. Also please keep a distance between you and others.

When You Enter - You should pick up a communion pack from the foyer and take your own communion to your seat. There will be no passing of trays for the Lord's Supper or Giving. The communion emblems will be in a plastic "baggie" and when you finish communion just put the trash in the baggie and seal. You can drop it in the trash when you leave.

Contribution - There will be contribution receptacles near the entrances that you can drop your contribution in.

Hand Sanitizer - Hand sanitizer is available. "No-touch" thermometers are available *if you wish to have your temperature taken*.

Seating - It is to be "socially distanced." Family groups who do not socially distance at home may sit together. Otherwise you need to sit in one of the designated pews.

Length of Service - The service will be designed to be 45 minutes, at the most 50 minutes. This does not "cut things short." We "save" a good bit of time in not passing any trays. (This could also cut down on "bathroom visits" – although you may go if you need to – which also cuts down on touching surfaces.)

Dismissal - The dismissal will be by rows/sections so that we do not have too many in the foyer at one time. You are requested to exit the building. If you want to visit with someone, please do it outside, keeping distance.

After Worship - A crew from our men will wipe down surfaces in the Auditorium to get ready for next week. So how long will we do all this? At least through the month of July. Things will then be re-evaluated. It could continue longer. This arrangement will be different, but all these differences are meant to keep you safe. Our first priority is to worship in spirit and truth. Our second priority is to keep you safe.

FROM THE MINISTER – STEVE HOUSLEY:

This Sunday is Special. This will be the first Sunday we have assembled in the auditorium in months. I would have never thought we would have suspended assembling and not so many years ago I could not have foreseen the ability of churches to stream worship and Bible Classes, and especially so cheaply. The virus is not gone; but, we are learning to live with it, and learning how we can do things to keep ourselves safe. I do believe that the assembly Sunday will be safe. There will be no 9 a.m. Bible Class. Bible Class will be streamed at 5 p.m. David will continue to teach from the book of Numbers. In worship at 10 a.m. we will be studying "Unity." It will be a lesson that has been on my mind for months. I believe we need to think on, study on, and work for unity in the Lord's church and here at Eastern Meadows more now than at almost any time in the past. Please read "As We Begin to Assemble Again..." that precedes this paragraph. It will explain how things Sunday worship will be conducted to keep everyone safe.

Listening. Over the past several years I have sought out discussion on race. Every year Polishing the Pulpit had, usually, more than one session dealing with some aspect of Race Relations and the church and the Bible. Sometimes it was one man presenting a lesson; sometimes it was a panel. Sometimes it was a younger man, Melvin Otey, or an older man, James DeBerry. One time there was a panel discussing interracial marriage. All of this has been helpful. More lately, our brethren have had several discussions streamed online and many have preached sermons (I have not dealt with this subject this year, as only about two years ago I preached

on this subject). On one occasion I listened for nearly two hours and was very disappointed in the discussion I heard (this is not one of the discussions recommended below). However, I have heard some good discussions and good sermons. If you want to listen to some good material on race in our country and race and the church and what the Bible says, I encourage you to listen to:

When We Come Back: Commitment

As congregations begin to gather again or make plans to do so in the near future, we're hoping Christians will make a concerted effort to not just fall back into the same routines as before. We believe there are areas in which we can learn from our time apart and come back even stronger. Last week's article discussed the importance of hospitality. This week we want to emphasize the importance of a renewed commitment as we begin to reconnect with our church family.

As church life ramps up once again, it's a good time to make the commitment to grow in our dedication to Christ, His people, and His mission. This unique situation has given us the ability to really look at our relationship with God and see how much we truly depended on Him, and how much we truly put into serving Him.

For those who were inconsistent in commitment before, I hope this COVID-19 experience has helped you realize what really matters. If your Christian life before was flagging, resolve to rededicate yourself. To be frank, if you struggled to make time for the Sunday "assembly" when it involved nothing more than turning on a screen from the comfort of your living room, when almost all of the usual distractions (sports, recreation, etc.) were shut down or forbidden, does your Christianity matter to you whatsoever? If you couldn't consistently "attend" in those circumstances (obvious exceptions excluded), how will you ever be engaged enough to be a fruit-bearing member of the body of Christ? Ask yourself – do I really consider my God and my church family to be priorities in my life?

Now that church gatherings are returning, distractions won't be far behind. Youth sports will start asking for your Sundays again. The lake will be calling. Your hobbies will fill up your calendar once more. The appeal to sleep in on Sundays will grow stronger for those who have to return to the office on Mondays. Now is your chance to make the commitment, before the temptation ever starts, to worship God and be with His people every Sunday. Attendance is not the fulfillment of our Christian duty – it's just the tip of the iceberg – but if we can't even commit to giving God our Sundays, how will we give Him anything else?

No, God does not expect perfection. But as we saw multiple times in Jesus' ministry, He really isn't interested in part-time followers. Life-altering commitment is a part of the deal. This is a unique opportunity to take stock of what your Christianity means to you. Will you use this chance to rededicate yourself to gathering with the saints, to learning and growing with them, to praying together, and to bearing fruit? Or will you continue to have a lukewarm relationship with Christ and His church?

Lest the more committed stumble into Pharisaism – "Unlike those inconsistent members, I watched every week during the lockdown, I'll continue to attend regularly, and I'm an involved member" – may we remember that with Jesus as our example, there is always room for every one of us to grow. As the doors open and we get to assemble once again, what ways might you be able to grow in your commitment? Maybe

it's hospitality, opening up your home to your church family and the lost in order to build relationships in the love of Christ. Maybe it's taking a younger disciple under your wing to teach them to pray, to study, and to serve others. Maybe it's committing to start connecting with your neighbors more, praying for open doors to reach them with the Gospel. If you're one who has stayed financially stable through this, maybe it means committing to sharing with those who have been rendered jobless by the lockdown. Whatever it may be for each of us, I hope this interruption to our routine has helped us realize the precious value of the days we've been given, and has renewed our urgency to do the Lord's work while we're here.

As we come back, make that extra commitment. You won't regret it. With the faith that God always rewards those who diligently seek Him (Hebrews 11:6), place your priorities where they truly matter most.
