FROM THE MINISTER – STEVE HOUSLEY:

This Sunday's Sermon by David Hester. This Sunday David will present the message, "An Ancient Recipe for Peace and Prosperity" (Psalms 122). David presents an excellent Bible lesson in an easy-to-listen-keep-your-attention manner. I suspect that this is a "timely" message as we all want peace, but especially in troubled times. Read Psalms 122 before coming to worship! I will not be here Sunday, but I will be listening to David's lesson on YouTube.

Visitors. Most Sunday's we do have some visitors under those masks. With the masks, and often getting to worship minutes before worship begins and the manner in which we dismiss, it is often hard to identify and greet visitors. But, please make a special effort to identify and speak to our guests. Even in the day of "social distancing," though we get "closer" to speak to them, we can still keep a distance too.

I Miss You. I readily admit that I miss you. I miss you who have not been assembling in fear of the virus. I miss seeing you who are assembling. There is just little time to speak and hold even a semblance of a conversation before or after the assembly. I love my church family more than ever and feel a bit of grief at not having the usual and normal association. Yes, it is better than the weeks of not assembling, but I miss you and love you.

I Appreciate You. Perhaps more than most times since I have been preaching, I have appreciated the faithfulness of the faithful. I guess that is the way to put it. Even when we were not assembling, which I would have never thought would happen, the faithful were diligent to worship in spite of not assembling. The "streaming" worship was an aid to help in that worship at home. At least one I know had no means of streaming, but still spent time singing the songs we were singing, personally praying, having the Lord's Supper, giving, and using the sermon outline we sent out as a means of study. The most of Eastern Meadows continued to give as faithfully and regularly as you did when we were meeting. Some have even told me they have given "extra" or even doubled their contribution because they realized the need. To all of you, I appreciate you.

Unity. Even after having preached five lessons on Unity this summer, I still find myself thinking about this subject. All of the things that could divide God's people in June certainly still exist. And there are more things than, I think, at any time in my life. Let me say this with all the emphasis that I can muster in a written sentence, We must be very careful about judging and distancing ourselves from a brother or sister over an opinion, even if we strongly disagree with their opinion. We must unite upon the doctrine of God, but realize that this world is full of things over which we might differ and still be brothers. Let us love and accept our brothers and let our brother know that we love and accept them. As Paul said, be "eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." (Ephesians 4:3). Let every action and word be filtered through these words of Paul in Ephesians 4:3.

Tim Gotkiewicz. Tim has been preparing video lessons that he puts up on YouTube for his Youth Class since March. He has always done a good job teaching these lessons. The lessons remain excellent. We Have an Anchor

As a ship would need an anchor to prevent it from being driven by the wind and waves onto a rugged, rock-infested shore and destroyed, without exception we all need an anchor for our lives to keep us from the storms of life that would destroy us. Our faith in Christ is just such an anchor—and especially we would view the resurrection of Christ in this regard. While all religions have their revered founders and gurus, all are powerless against the winds of time that would drive us onto the shores of God's judgment. Only Christianity has a founder who died for our sins and been raised from the dead. Death is not the ultimate conqueror. Though even Jesus, in death, willingly gave up His spirit into the Father's hands, yet, as a verse in one of our hymns declares, "Death could not keep his prey." He arose in triumph over death, and holds within His hands "the keys of hell (hades) and of death" (Rev. 1:18). Ours is not a dead savior, but the Living One. Without the assurance of a living Savior, we would be at the mercy of all that is spiritually destructive to our souls. We would not even be assured of who Jesus is—the Son of God. After all, anyone could make the claim. Of Jesus alone can it be said that He was "declared to be the Son of God with power, according to the spirit of holiness, by the resurrection of Jesus from the dead" (Romans 1:4). We know who He is because of His resurrection.

Without His resurrection we would have no assurance of our own. Death would be the great ultimate destroyer. But because He was raised, we, too, will be raised. In 1 Corinthians 15, the apostle Paul linked our resurrection to His, saying, "If Christ be not raised, your faith is vain: ye are yet in your sins. Then they also which are fallen asleep in Christ are perished. If in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of all men most miserable. But now is Christ risen from the dead, and become the firstfruits of them that slept. For since by man (Adam) came death, by man (Christ) came also the resurrection of the dead" (15:17-20). Hebrews 6:19-20a compares His resurrection to the believer's anchor, declaring, "which hope we have as an anchor of the soul, both sure and stedfast, and which entereth into that within the veil, whither the forerunner is for us entered, even Jesus." This hope is secure—"within the veil," that is, beyond the veil of death into heaven itself, where the risen Christ has entered as the "forerunner", preparing the way for our resurrection. Our eternal welfare is established only in the crucified, risen and glorified Son of God. For the believer, it is as one hymn declares: "We have an anchor that keeps the soul, Steadfast and sure while the ages roll...."

The greatest question we could ask is: Is your faith anchored and made secure in Christ. Have you accepted Him, who, by the grace of God, "tasted death for every man?" (Hebrews 2:9) Have you identified yourself with Him in being "buried with Him in baptism" and raised with Him to walk "in newness of life" (Rom. 6:3-4). Is it your hope to continue that walk till you share in "the likeness of His resurrection" (6:5)?—to share His glory?
